



December 18 & 19: The Light of Joy

Series Overview

Holiday lights are beautiful, but nothing compares to the light of Christ. In this series, we're exploring the true meaning of Christmas and how we can uncover the light, shine the light and even be light to others.



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Sermon Highlights

Philippians 2:3, Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather, in humility value others above yourselves.

When I read that verse I realize how far I have to grow in the Christian life, because I can't say I never do anything out of selfishness. I do a lot of things out of selfish ambition.

Philippians 2:4, Each of you should look not only to your own interests, but also to the interests of others.

The Bible is realistic. It doesn't say, "Don't ever look to your own interests." It says, "Not only to your own interests," but be in touch with the interests of others.

Philippians 2:6-7, ⁶Who being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be used to his own advantage; ⁷rather, he made himself nothing by taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness.

Jesus set aside His own interests to become flesh. *Luke 2:6-7, ⁶While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, ⁷and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no guest room available for them.*

We are to bring joy to others. Jesus left the glory of heaven for a cave in this world. He had the world at His feet but He came to wash the feet of the world. And now we are to reflect that same attitude. What does that look like?

1. Do nothing out of selfish ambition.

We look out for ourselves. In fact, we learn early on, "If I don't look out for myself, nobody else will." It's our nature, and it's how we're nurtured. In our society it's all about standing up for my right. We make sure that our rights aren't being violated.

But what do you do when you are asked to treat someone you don't even know with love and kindness? That is when the incarnation—God becoming flesh—becomes real. When someone doesn't say thank you. When they give you nothing in return. When someone is unlovable and you show them the light of Christ's joy that you've received. That's the incarnation.

Romans 5:8, But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us.

When we show other people His light and put their interests ahead of our own, we bring light to darkness. Paul said, "Consider others better than yourselves."

2. Do everything without complaining.

Philippians 2:14-16, ¹⁴Do everything without grumbling or arguing, ¹⁵so that you may become blameless and pure, "children of God without fault in a warped and crooked generation." Then you will shine among them like stars in the sky ¹⁶as you hold firmly to the word of life.

God sent His Son to save us, but we just whine about this and that. God sends His Son to earth as a baby. "But God, can't you do something about my retirement fund?"

He has saved you from your sins. That's the value of this season. When we are reminded of what we've been given, we realize we have nothing to complain about. When we see what Jesus has given to us, it puts it in proper perspective.

He left the throne of heaven for this world, and He never had a home to call His own. His family misunderstood Him, His friends abandoned Him. He never did one thing wrong, but He was beaten and brutally killed.

But Jesus never said, "It's not fair." He never whined or complained because things weren't going His way. And that attitude of joy is what we are to reflect in our own lives.

This Christmas experience the incarnation in your own life. Let that light change your life and your relationships. Instead of transferring the fear and anxiety of this world, reflect His peace to the people around you.

Instead of transferring bitterness, reflect His forgiveness. Instead of transferring anger, reflect His kindness. Instead of transferring a critical spirit, reflect His encouragement, joy and goodness. Because after all: Joy to the world, the Lord has come!



Take it to the source ... Bible Study

Introductory question: If you could get one ultimate Christmas present, with no expense limitations, what would it be? Why?

Read *Philippians 2:3-7*, *Ephesians 4:1-2* and *Colossians 3:12-14*.

1. How can selfish ambition or vain conceit hinder our relationship with God? With others?
2. How does humility keep us aware of the fact that we are completely dependent upon God?
3. What are some of the ways that Christ took the nature of a servant? How can we follow His example?

Read *Philippians 2:14-16*.

1. What do you complain about the most? How does it affect your sense of peace and joy when you complain a lot?
2. How often do you stop to thank God for the blessings in your life? How might that affect a person's tendency to complain?
3. What is the biggest blessing you have had this year? What have you done to show your gratitude to God?
4. What things can your small group do to encourage each other to stay positive as you point others to Christ?

Read *Luke 2:1-20*.

1. What are some of the things that strike you as you remember the events surrounding Jesus' birth? What must it have been like for the Son of God to become a small, helpless baby?
2. As a baby, Jesus was denied a place in the inn. What are some of the ways that we deny Him room in our lives today?
3. What is the direct connection between serving and joy? Why do we experience more joy and peace when we think less about ourselves?
4. As we face a new year, what are some ways that you can look beyond your own circumstances to see how you can bring the joy of Christ to others?



Take it home ... Practical Applications

In your time with God this week, ask God to show you places in your life where you need to exchange bitterness for forgiveness and anger for kindness. Ask Him to give you opportunities to bring the positive joy of His life to those that you meet, then take those opportunities to be a practical source of encouragement, joy and goodness.
